11. Tom Anderson (1910-1991) was taught to play fiddle by his grandfather in Eshaness, Shetland, and went on to collect as much of Shetland's traditional music as he could. He also performed, taught many young Shetlanders (including Catriona MacDonald, Aly Bain and Trevor Hunter). A prolific composer, many of Anderson' tunes are played around the world, his most famous being *Da Slockit Light*.





12. *Ian Powrie* (1923-2001) began to play fiddle when he was five, and later played in a dance band led by his brother Bill, who played accordion. The bands he formed on his own held a worldwide reputation, regularly recording and appearing on radio and television, including BBC's White Heather Club. Jimmy Blue was a button accordionist in the Ian Powrie Band; he named his house *Tigh na Gorm* (House of Blue).

No.13: John McCusker John McCusker was born in Bellshill in 1973 and took up fiddle at an early age. He formed a folk group - Parcel o' Rogues - when he was 14, and joined the well-established Battlefield Band when he was still a teenager, staying with them for eleven years. Since then he has mainly recorded as a solo performer, but he has collaboarted with many other artists. Billy's Reel was composed for Billy Connolly.











No.14: Gordon Duncan Gordon Duncan (1964-2005) of Pitlochry, Perthshire, was a master piper and an innovative composer and performer. He took up the pipes at aged 10, and started winning prizes by the time he was 15. Later he



performed with Wolfstone, Ceolbeg and the Tannahill Weavers.



No.15: Ronnie Cooper Shetland musician Ronnie Cooper (1934-1982) was a pianist and accordionist from Lerwick. He played in a few bands in Shetland, including the famous Hamefarers, but it is as a composer of tunes that he is most remembered now. His compositions have, in my opinion, an indefinable quality which set them apart from the ordinary. Cooper's best known tunes include The Anvil, Miss Susan Cooper, Ronas Voe, Da Tushkar, Peter Davidson and Hayfield House.






No.16: Robert Mackintosh (c1745-1807) from Tullymet, Perthshire, was regarded as one of Niel Gow's great rivals, and indeed taught fiddle to Gow's son Nathaniel. As a musician and composer, Mackintosh occupied an exalted position.

No.17: Captain Simon Fraser of Knockie (1773-1852) was taught fiddle by Niel Gow's son Nathaniel. In 1816 he published a collection of tunes mostly learned from his father and grandfather, who were also fiddlers.

No.18: Ian Hardie of Edinburgh (1952-2012) started playing fiddle at age six. He became a founding member of the influential folk group Jock Tamson's Bairns. His many compositions are highly regarded and enjoyed by many musicians to this day.






No.19: Phil Cunningham (b.1960, Edinburgh) first came to fame as a member of his brother's folk group Silly Wizard. Subsequently he collaborated with many other musicians, most notably Aly Bain, with whom he has toured for decades.

No.20: Fergie MacDonald (b.1938, Glasgow) is a button accordionist and band leader. He grew up in Moidart and as well as having a successful music career, he has been a physiotherapist and an international clay pigeon shooter.
