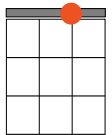
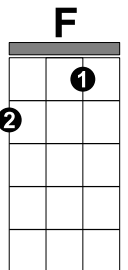
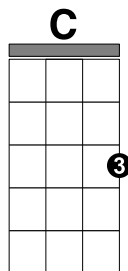
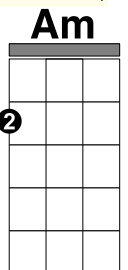
El Condor Pasa (Robles/Simon)
