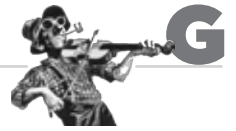

Georgia Black Bottom (traditional)

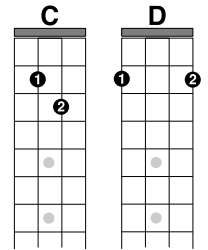

Line 1: If you go down in Black Bot - tom Put your mon-ey in your shoes; The

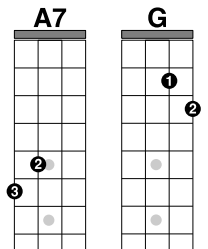
Line 2: wo - men in Black Bot - tom got them Black Bot - tom blues.
