Scottish Fiddlers

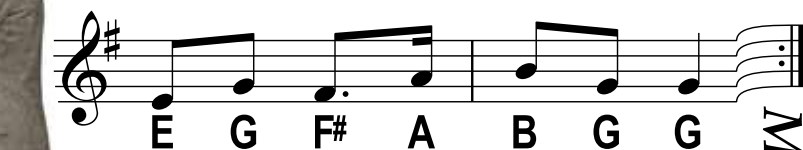
The Roshven Fiddler (Fergie MacDonald)

The Roshven Fiddler was **Farqhar MacRae** (1925-2000), pictured above, who played alongside Aonghas Grant in the Roshven Ceilidh Band. He composed the popular tune Farquhar & Hettie's Waltz.

Cameron Men Polka No.2 (traditional)



*The Cameron Men were four brothers, **Bill, Jim, George** (all fiddlers) and **Stewart Cameron** (pianist) from Kirriemuir who recorded many 78s during the 1930s, including a couple of untitled polkas which now bear their name.*

Louisa "Lucy" Johnston (1760-1797) inspired tributes from prominent fiddlers of her day. Niel Gow, Daniel Dow, Robert "Red Rob" Macintosh and Niel's son Nathaniel all composed tunes in her honour, and in 1795 Robert Burns sent her a poem he had written about, he said, "that incomparable woman."

The Gows published her composition Miss Lucy Johnston's Compliments to Niel Gow in their third collection of 1792. Niel Gow was, of course, the most celebrated Scottish fiddler of the 18th and early 19th centuries.
